Tuesday, October 22, 5 pm

President Nordlinger and Finance Committee chair Michael Pocalyko ('11) will lead a town hall meeting devoted to a conversation about Club finances. This is an opportunity for members to interact with the Club's financial leadership, who can address questions about any of the following topics:

• The Club's overall excellent financial health.

• Ways and means of obtaining financial resources.

• How revenues and costs are accounted for.

• The annual budget process and the Finance Committee's oversight of the Club's operational performance as compared to the budget.

• The Financial Snapshot located in the members' section of the Club's website and the information it provides to Club members.

• The underlying assumptions of the budget and the Club's long-range financial plan.

• How membership demographics and new member additions affect the rate of increase in annual dues.

• The recent Board approval of an increase in the initiation fee effective on January 1, 2020.

- The forthcoming liquidation of the Club's debt.
- Managing cash reserves in the event of economic downturn.

Return of the Airship

Wednesday, October 23, 6:30 pm

Prior to the crash of the Hindenburg, over 50 million passenger miles had been logged, and airships, the first intercontinental air service, traveled at 130 mph. Today, there is a global movement to again use the airship as a major means of transportation. Engineering advances and the use of helium, an alternative noncombustible gas, for inflation make airships a viable means to transport some types of freight over long distances.

Don Hartsell, commissioner of the World Air League, will discuss the history of airships and describe the environmentally friendly nature of them in contrast to polluting cargo freighter jets.

As an agent of change, a "World Sky Race" is planned for September 2022 to May 2023, in which more than thirty-five airships are proposed to circumnavigate the planet, starting at the Greenwich Meridian and finishing at the Palace of Versailles. The race has raised a \$1 million prize to modernize sustainable green lighterthan-air technology, which needs little or no new infrastructure. Airships require no roads, harbors, railroads or runways. Starting with proven 1930s engineering and with updated materials and safety, airships are expected to be a viable economical sustainable means of transporting cargo.

Hartsell, a Houston attorney, led the largest book restoration in history for the Los Angeles Public Library, using vacuum-induced sublimation and dehydration of paper and coating emulsions. He also developed an ultraviolet sterilization chamber to provide non-toxic mold conservation for the Houston Baptist University's rare American Bible collection.
